In recognition of the extraordinary leadership of LION's founding Board Chair, Herb Fixler, we are excited to announce the creation of the new Herb Fixler Family Engagement Center and the development of the Herb Fixler Scholarship. This space seeks to recognize and amplify how character education and family engagement positively affect a student's success. Herb has seen that impact firsthand, and it continues to drive his commitment to and leadership at LION. He affirms that LION's Family Engagement Program "is a core element of LION's school culture" that "can and has changed the lives of those who have experienced it."



The decision to create this space within our building at 830 Hunts Point Avenue is purposeful. The high school building is a testament to Herb's tireless work to bring educational vitality to the significantly underresourced and historically underserved Hunts Point community. When 830 Hunts Point Avenue was constructed under Herb's stewardship in 2011, it was the first new high school to be built in the neighborhood in 30 years. 
Kindergarten **Stepping Up**

Miatta Massaley Elementary School Director

Tell us about yourself.

I have been working with students in schools for over 13 years, which is what I love to do. I was born in Queens, NY and raised on Long Island. From there I went to college at Penn State and got my master's degree from Hunter College. After I graduated from Penn State, I moved into the city and ultimately settled in Harlem. I live there with my one year old son and his father. I also have a dog named Dinero who I love.

Why did you decide to get into education, and what was the path that you took to get here?

I went into education because I think that it is important that all children receive an excellent and inclusive educational experience, no matter who you are or where you come from. In order to get here, I first went to college at Penn State where I thought I wanted to be a lawyer. When I

graduated, I joined Teach for America first while also being in graduate school for my master's degree in education. From there, I decided education is where I wanted to stay, and I have been here ever since.

Why did you choose LION?

I chose LION because it was clear that LION invests heavily in the success of all people in the school community. It is a place that families continue to choose for their scholars, and staff choose to stay - that means a lot for the future success of students. I also chose LION because it was clear to me that when making decisions, the bottom line is always "what will best serve scholars."

Which pillar resonates with you most?

Social Justice. Social Justice is the reason I do this work. I believe that all scholars should have access to an excellent education and resources, no matter their zip code, and I have advocated for that for my entire career.

What advice would you give to students and families to have a successful 2023-2024?

Believe that you can achieve and never doubt your potential. Also, just know that we are always partners in this work, not just today, but always.





Tell us about yourself.

I am from the Dominican Republic but have been a Bronx native since the age of 2. I am the proud parent of a LION high school senior and am preparing to welcome another baby girl in November of this year. In my spare time I like to think of myself as an unofficial food critic and often times try to replicate recipes.

Why did you decide to get into education, and what was the path that you took to get here?

I always knew I wanted to work in education. Growing up, school was a window to other parts of the world for me, and oftentimes I buried myself in literature to escape things that were not as pleasant. I also questioned the variety of experiences I had in school and wanted to be a change agent in my community. At first, I wanted to go into social work, but after completing my undergraduate degree, I decided to try teaching with Teach for America (2014 corps member) and have remained at LION since.

Why did you choose LION, and what do you love most about the LION Community?

I chose LION because I saw myself in the students and families. It truly is a unique place that values the individual and what we each have to contribute to the community. It is a place that has seen me grow as a professional, a human being, and a parent.

What are you most proud of from this past school year?

I am extremely proud of everyone, truly. Returning to school after the pandemic has been an adjustment period for all, but there have been so many wins. We welcomed more students than ever in this year's National Elementary and National Junior Honor Societies' induction ceremonies. 94% of 8th graders passed their Algebra 1 regent exam on the first try, the Lacrosse team lost one game in the entire season, and so much more! There were so many moments of joy throughout the year, and I hope we can continue to spread the joy of learning across our community. I do have to emphasize that there was something magical about traveling to Paris, France with 20 students. It's a moment that will forever be remembered.

Which pillar resonates with you most?

The pillar that resonates most with me is Community. The Bronx is a special place and there are so many assumptions made, but we are so strong when it comes to community. I truly believe in the phrase "it takes a village..." and this can only be made possible by being rooted in our community.

Tell us about yourself

I was born and raised in Washington Heights, and I currently live in NJ with my wife Kristen and two sons, Derek and Luca.

Why did you decide to get into education, and what was the path that you took to get here?

My mother and older brother worked at a small independent school in Harlem where I also had the chance to volunteer each summer. I loved my experience and working with youth. After undergrad, I was looking for a career that would have an impact on my community and allow me to work with youth. Education soon became the obvious choice.

Why did you choose LION?

I started 17 years ago as a founding faculty member. I loved the idea of working with a community and building a school in collaboration with staff, family, and students. Summer Rising



Although the 2022-2023 school year may have ended, our students are always excited to learn and grow! This year LION was proud to offer our full-day Summer Rising program once again to students entering Grades 1-9 in the fall. The over 200 students enrolled were able to benefit from additional English Language Arts and mathematics learning opportunities to ensure they are prepared for the rigors of their upcoming grade. Students also engaged in enrichment courses, including art and dance, special events, and field trips, such as a Circle Line cruise around the Hudson River and a visit to local, Black-owned businesses, the Lit Bar and Playa Gelato. Elementary students ended their program with a block party for families featuring dance performances that students spent the summer working on with Performing Arts Teacher Danielle Nicolosi.

Over the course of the summer, staff worked tirelessly to ensure students had the best experience possible. They were most impressed by students' willingness to learn and their growth throughout the program. Elementary Summer School Director Lindsay Alexander shared, "I was excited to see the students' eagerness to attend the program each day and explore or review different math and reading tools. The new phonics program really helped students grasp concepts and grow as strong independent readers. It was also exciting to see the scholars participate in field trips that helped them learn about their community!" Students eagerness was evident through their daily attendance, which was over 90% for the course of the program.

For the second year in a row, LION is proud to be the recipient of a Bloomberg Philanthropies Summer Boost grant, which enabled us to offer a comprehensive summer program that engaged our students in critical learning opportunities and experiences. "Being a Leader in a Male-Dominated Industry" An Interview with Sara Luna

Michael Morales: What is new and exciting for you right now?

Sara Luna: For me right now, the last thing I was working on is building housing that can not only house people but can bring people together. My partner and I worked on designing a housing complex in Rosario, Argentina that not only housed people but also helped artists to hone their skills. One of the big things we noticed from researching the site was the socio-economic impact that the building was able to make. There are flea markets in the area where people get necessities. So, not only do the residents now have a better residence, better quality housing, but the area itself has commercial space that can help elevate and provide for this community, such as how Hunts Point is growing as a residential and business community.

What were some of the highlights of your time as a student at LION?

The support! Leaving the school, you find that the support you still get post graduation is better than most of the support you will receive outside of school. Simply being able to apply those six LION pillars outside of the school is just as important as learning them inside of the school to be able to establish that leadership in yourself. You can't begin what you want to do unless you lead yourself to it. I was able to take that leadership quality with me into architecture because I was given tools and techniques. However, it's up to you to become great at architecture by building on those skills. I would say personally outside of school, especially in my career which is primarily male-dominated, you have to find that leadership in order to persevere in your career.



How did your experience at LION prepare you for college? I feel like it was a thorough preparation for college. Once you get to college

you speak to a lot of people from different parts of the city and schools, and it's not as thorough as it is here. A lot of the information that I left with here seems smacked upon you and suddenly is really useful because a lot of other students from other schools weren't given the same information or guidance that I received from LION.



I have a year left from the City College Architecture Program. After graduation, I'd like to start my own construction company. My dad has contracting experience and construction experience. So, hopefully I can find a way to get all the paperwork I would need done, start a business, and start my own construction company with the skills I've acquired throughout my career, being able to put my designs into play, and providing some kind of stability for my family.

What are three pieces of advice you would give students preparing for college?

Get what you need to get done, done. I feel like a lot of people procrastinate their senior year because it's more socially acceptable to slack off at this point in your high school career. Don't do it! I also had an issue procrastinating and could have had a more effective senior year if I had applied the same mindset that I had at the beginning of my high school career. As a student who did well. I didn't get things done how I wanted them to be done. Everyone has different scenarios that are affecting them, but it doesn't mean you won't succeed. I had to wait a year to enter the field I wanted, but now I'm almost done with the course. It won't always be a straight journey, but as long as you have the motivation, you'll make it there even if it's at a different time than others. So, definitely persevere, get things done, and keep that goal in mind. If it is a true goal and true passion of yours, that will keep you moving forward.

Imani Burroughs Middle School


